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Understanding basic research methods and learning to evaluate evidence presented to you are important professional and life skills! Your own research can support change and provide information about how a program or intervention is working. Evaluating others' research can help you make informed decisions, both in your personal and professional life. As we are faced with more and more information via the web and other media, we must develop the skills to decide whether information is useful and accurate. As professionals we want to provide the best possible services to our clients. In our personal lives, we are increasingly asked to make important decisions such as choosing healthcare plans, where to send a child to school, and how to plan for retirement. Although choice is always welcome, it requires us to become better at critical thinking and the evaluation of information. This is a hands-on hybrid course where you will spend time each week engaged in research design, field observations, reading, computer lab work, writing and/or problem solving with a research team. By the time you complete HSP 385, you will have the basic skills needed to engage in the research process and prepare basic reports within your workplace.

HSP 385 also satisfies WWU's **writing proficiency requirement** that must be met prior to graduation. You will have many opportunities to improve your writing and critical analysis skills during the quarter. During this course, you will write and revise a research proposal, receiving feedback from multiple sources including myself, your peers, and the WWU Writing Center. HSP 385 serves as a pre-requisite for HSP 485 (Program Planning and Evaluation).

All weekly readings are accessible through the Blackboard site. They include both links to web readings and articles (PDFs) you can download. Please be prepared to discuss the readings during class. Many weeks will have multiple-choice quizzes regarding the reading on Blackboard.

COURSE DETAILS

Participation, Assignments, Lab Assignments, and Blackboard:

- All take-home assignments will be discussed in class and posted on Blackboard. If you missed class, it is your responsibility to check Blackboard for assignments and contact me if you have questions. In HSP 385, participation involves group discussions and presenting related to course projects, readings, and assignments. This course is fast-paced, so it's important to attend and participate as fully as possible. Expect to spend approximately 8-10 hours per week outside of class time participating, reading, and completing course assignments. Participation is very important to succeeding in this course. **Students missing more than two weeks of class participation will not pass the course.**
- PLEASE come see me or email me right away if you are having trouble or don't understand something. Also, I am happy to hold small group tutorials outside of class if students think they could benefit from this. Let me know!

Weekly assignments:

This course is a lab course—we do a lot of hands-on work in the computer lab and in the field during class-time. In addition, there are take-home assignments and sometimes difficult readings. It is vital that you come to class if you want to learn the material. In addition, plan on the assignments and readings taking a *significant amount of time each week* to complete.

Submitting Assignments

All assignments should be typed (APA style, if applicable) and submitted at the BEGINNING of class on the assigned due date. I only accept assignments that are attached under “Assignments” on the Blackboard site (unless there are extenuating circumstances). Your “proof” that you submitted your paper on time is the confirmation you receive from Blackboard once you upload your assignment. Please save this confirmation in case there is a problem later on. This is the ONLY proof I will accept that you turned your assignments in on time.

Research Proposal – (Capstone Portfolio Contribution):

In HSP 385 you will develop a research proposal regarding a social problem that most interests you. You will be working on this project in a series of steps from question formulation to literature review, to proposed research methods. You will have the opportunity to gain feedback from your peers and from me and revise your work throughout the quarter. The final submission should incorporate revisions derived from critiques by your peers and me. This assignment and its process of revision meets Western's Writing Proficiency requirement and also demonstrates mastery of CSHSE Standard #15. The final research proposal should be included in your capstone portfolio.

Written Work Policy: All written work must be typed, double-spaced, and grammatically correct. All assignments should conform to APA Publication guidelines. Please proofread work before submitting. Poor writing skills and submission of work that does not address assignment criteria will influence the final grade.
